## OVERALL K-12 ENROLMENT

For several years, the district has been experiencing a decline in overall Kindergarten to grade 12 enrolment as larger cohorts of grade 12 students, in the range of 4400 to 4700 students, have been graduating to be replaced by significantly smaller Kindergarten cohorts, in the range of 3400 to 3700 students.

Projections indicate that the district will continue to see an overall modest decline of approximately 250 FTE for the 2017-18 school year largely due to the difference-between incoming vs. outgoing cohort sizes. Projections for the 2018-19 school year indicate that there will be a significant enrolment decline of approximately 450 students (K-12 Headcount, no International Education or Distributed Learning) below the 2017-18 enrolment. Beyond 2018-19 enrolment is expected to decline incrementally and then stabilize beginning in 2020, based on current projections for the population of school-aged children living in Vancouver.

As of April 21, 2017, there were 3692 Kindergarten students pre-registered for September 2017 which is slightly above the projected enrolment.

## KINDERGARTEN ENROLMENT - 'FULL' SCHOOLS

Two criteria were used by the district to identify 'full' schools:

- Insufficient space to accommodate catchment Kindergarten students for September 2017
- School will be used to accommodate overflow from full schools indicated with an *

Table 2 below summarizes application and placement information at schools where there was insufficient space to accommodate all regular program catchment applicants for kindergarten.

Catchment kindergarten students who could not be accommodated at their catchment school were offered placements at nearby school(s). The number of students placed at nearby schools is shown in the column labelled 'Number of Placed K's' in the table below.

The number of catchment kindergarten students who accepted a cross-boundary placement, a choice program placement, or enrolled in an independent school is shown in the column labelled 'Number of K's not placed or enrolled at catchment school' in the table below.

It is important to note that the number of placed students is likely to decline between now and September 2017 due to a number of variables including ongoing cross boundary acceptance, families relocating, and ongoing Kindergarten choice program offers.

## KINDERGARTEN ENROLMENT - CHOICE PROGRAMS

For the fourth year, parents accessed an online application process to apply for Kindergarten choice programs. The online application process was open during January and early February.

The charts below provide a summary of the total number of spaces available across the district for Kindergarten choice programs, the number of applicants who indicated their first choice for each program, and the number of students (based on first choice) waitlisted.

## Program Intake

Program intake is lower for a variety of reasons including ability to staff programs with qualified teachers, reduced class size, and space considerations.

## Waitlist Comparison

This year, waitlists for Kindergarten French Immersion program are longer than they have been in the past. This difference is primarily accounted for by the reduced program intake for 2017.

## ENROLMENT - SECONDARY MINI SCHOOL PROGRAMS

This spring 1344 students completed the mini school assessment and submitted applications for entrance into a grade eight program.

There are seventeen Mini School programs across the district with most secondary schools hosting one program with the following exceptions: Kitsilano and Magee which do not host a district Mini School program, Vancouver Technical, and Britannia each host two programs.

Most of the programs admit a maximum of 28 students, with the exceptions being Hamber which has accepted 64 students, and Byng Arts which has accepted 84 students.

At present District Mini School programs have accepted 466 students (or approximately 35\% of initial applicants) for the 2016-17 school year. The mini-school offer/acceptance process in not yet complete.

## ENROLMENT - SECONDRY CROSS BOUNDARY

Cross boundary application data has been collated for all secondary schools. For September 2017, a total of 1037 cross boundary applications were submitted, with 856 ( $83 \%$ ) of these applications from students transitioning from grade seven to grade eight.

The 856 grade eight applications were submitted by 602 individuals. Using the figure of approximately 3515 grade seven students, approximately $17 \%$ of grade seven students submitted a cross boundary application for grade eight.

About 11\% fewer grade 8-12 cross-boundary applications were submitted for the 2017-18 school year than for the current school year. At this time, it is not possible to provide information on the number of cross boundary applications accepted at various school sites as the process is still underway. Schools accept cross boundary applications based on available space and only after the school has assured they will be able to accommodate in-catchment registrants up to the second Friday in June.

## VSB MARKET SHARE 2007-2016

Market share is a ratio of the number of students enrolled to the total school aged population. For this chart, K-12 enrolment was compared with the population estimate of 5 to 17 year olds living in Vancouver provided by Baragar Systems.
